Calcium chloride has been spread on Randolph Hill Road to reduce dust in response to many, many, many complaints about the dust. Because of its hygroscopic properties, calcium chloride is commonly applied to dirt road surfaces to keep a liquid layer on the surface to hold dust down. It is regularly used on dirt roads in Randolph in the spring and on the roads during the winter. According to Eric Grenier, EIT, of HEB Bergeron Engineers, the contractor, Nelson Communications Services, anticipates completing enough work from High Acres Road to the Bradley property by early August to install the base course of pavement, which will help with the dust on the top section of the roadway.

Randolph Hill Road is expected to be under construction until October.
